Inspection process summary

Inspections can be announced or unannounced. Inspections generally start in the Emergency Department (ED) or outpatients department and follow a patient's journey to an inpatient ward.

On-site



On-site review of at least 2 (normally 3) clinical areas. 2 service provider meetings on site. All serious risks are notified.

Report



HIQA drafts report. Draft issued to hospital for factual accuracy review. 5 working days to review / respond. Report published on www.higa.ie.

QIP



Hospitals must publish quality improvement plan (QIP) within 6 weeks of HIQA publishing report.

Monitoring




1,499 hand hygiene opportunities were observed during the 54 inspections These are key moments when staff should wash their hands and / or use appropriate hand-rub gels
